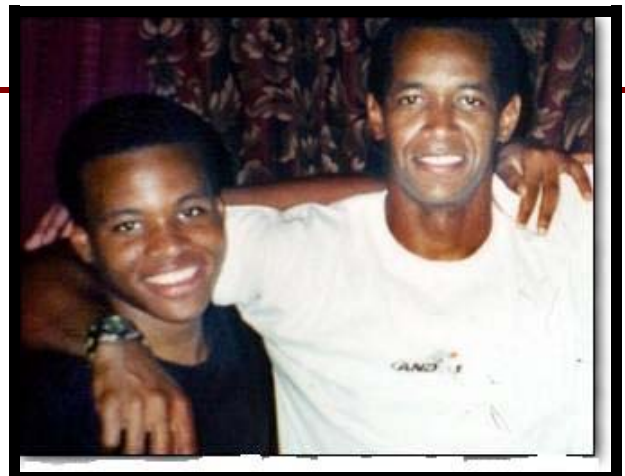


Sniper Suspects Arrested

A former Army soldier and a teenager, were arrested at a Maryland rest stop and could be charged with murder later. The suspects were identified as John

Teacher Workshops

Several of the teachers at Roy Municipal Schools have had opportunities to attend a variety of educational workshops during the past month. The elementary teachers, Mrs. Phyllis Ivey, Mrs. Barbara Smith, and Mrs. Sandy Ray were trained in the "DIBELS" process. The "Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills" program was presented by Ms. Dana Stoltz-Gray of the High Plains Regional Education Cooperative at Roy Schools on September 30th. The National Institute of Child Health and Human Development studies approximately 10,000 children over the past 15 years and research has proven that for 85 to 90 percent or poor readers, prevention and early intervention programs that combine instruction in phoneme awareness, phonics, spelling, reading fluency, and reading comprehension strategies provided by well-trained teachers can increase reading

skills to average reading levels. The Roy Elementary teachers are excited about the training implementing the DIBELS program in their classrooms.

Mrs. Cheryl Scott attended a "Handwriting Without Tears" workshop in Virginia Beach, Virginia. This workshop is a simple developmentally-based curriculum for writing readiness, printing, and cursive. The multi-sensory lessons teach to address all learning styles; visual, auditory, tactile, and kinesthetic. The unique materials and appealing workbooks eliminate problems with letter formation, reversals, legibility, sentence spacing, and cursive connections. Mrs. Scott and Ms. Marti Lockwood, Occupational Therapist, plan to implement this new writing program in the elementary grades throughout the rest of the year.

On October 8th and 9th, Mrs. Dorothy Hazen and Mrs. Cheryl Scott

attended a workshop in Taos. The presenters from Colorado were also the developers of the program. Mr. James Martin and Ms. Laura Huber Marshall created the Self-Directed IEP and Choice-Maker Curriculum Training program. The two day program presented some good insight into helping students choose and set employment goals, choose and set personal goals, and choose and set educational goals and implement their goals by learning how to take action. Some very good materials, purchased by the High Plains Regional Education Cooperative, were brought back to the school district and will be used by the students in the Career and Life Planning Class. Many school districts in New Mexico were represented at this workshop and valuable insight was gained by the sharing of information from various districts.

Keep New Mexico Beautiful, Inc. Awards Beautification Grant to Roy Schools

Richard Hazen, Superintendent, has been notified that Roy Schools were awarded a \$500 beautification grant by Keep New Mexico Beautiful Inc. through grant money provided by New Mexico Clean and Beautiful.

The money will be used to purchase trees and a drip system for the trees. Loren Mayer, science teacher, and students in his science classes will plant and maintain the trees. This will be a

hands-on learning project. Students will study requirements for seed germination and the life cycle of trees. The students will be involved in the planting, measuring, and graphing tree growth annually. Trigonometry in Physics will be used to calculate the tree growth as well as changes observed. Students will participate in scholarly discussions regarding linear growth and a comparison to exponential change. Trees will be the essential elements in illustrating these con-

cepts each year as presented in the Life Science, Physics and Earth Science classes.

The New Dyslexia Program

This year Roy Schools has introduced a new program which assists students who have been diagnosed with dyslexia. Mrs. Janet Costa, under the direction of Mrs. Cheryl Scott, implements a dyslexia program with students who qualify under dyslexia guidelines. Mrs. Costa spent part of her summer in an intense 3-week program to be trained in the use of materials and techniques utilized by the Alpha-Phonics Dyslexia Program. The Scottish Rite sponsors the two-year training and assists districts if they have difficulties acquiring funding for the Alpha-Phonics Program.

In her classes, Mrs. Costa teaches dyslexic students many

techniques enabling them to be more able to cope with the problems that dyslexia may create in academic areas which require reading. The program is a multi-sensory program utilizing its own set of materials and manipulatives which assist students in learning necessary word attack skills, improve their spelling, handwriting and reading.

Dyslexia is a language-based learning disability that affects over 10% of the population. Research has proven that dyslexia is the most common form of all learning disabilities. Dyslexia is hereditary and it is proven that it will not be 'outgrown' and it is NOT a result of low intelligence, brain injury, or disease. Dyslexia is very real for the students that are affected by it, but with enough patience and the use of certain learned tech-

niques and skills, dyslexia can be dealt with, making these students more successful academically.

The Roy School district is the only district in the northeastern part of New Mexico that is implementing the Alpha-Phonics Dyslexia Program and so far it is proving to be a great success. The Alpha-Phonics program starts students at 3rd grade level and goes throughout the high school grades.

In the near future the school will also purchase and be trained in the 'Lexia' program that will give help to the K-3rd grade students with dyslexia diagnosis.
